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Assessment 101

Assessment 101 workshops are comprised of faculty and staff from a variety of backgrounds. Originally designed for academic program assessment coordinators at James Madison University, the programming has expanded over the years to include student affairs practitioners and support staff from curriculum design units. Due to growing demand, we opened the workshop up to assessment practitioners outside of JMU in 2019. That year, we welcomed 17 assessment practitioners from six different institutions representing five states and three countries.

How do I attend?

For participants internal to JMU, the workshop is provided at no cost, but is subject to nomination by the dean of each college, and the division of student affairs. If you would like to be considered for a future 101 workshop please contact your dean or department head and express your interest.

For external, non-JMU participants, a number of seats per section have been reserved. The cost to attend the workshop is \$1,500 per person and includes any printed materials provided throughout the course of the weeklong workshop. A discount may be available for institutions sending multiple attendees.

Workshops take place on the campus of James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Virginia and are held multiple times throughout the year, typically in the summer.



Assessment 101 is a 5-day interactive workshop that allows participants to practice the components of the assessment cycle. With a special emphasis on learning improvement, the workshop examines topics such as:

- Writing student learning outcomes
- Mapping the curriculum
- Creating instruments
- Examining implementation fidelity
- Analyzing data
- Reporting results
- Using results to make evidence-based decisions

From this workshop, participants learn valuable information and skills to carry over to their own department.

Student Affairs Assessment

Student affairs professionals are expected to have Assessment, Evaluation and Research (AER) competencies. However, there is often inconsistent coverage of these skills in formal HESA graduate programs. In response to the ever-growing need for these skills, Assessment 101 has been curated to facilitate development of these competencies. Specifically, as we cover the assessment process we emphasize how each step maps to these professional competencies. The importance of program theory and evidence-informed programming frames this workshop. Student affairs professionals at JMU have found this workshop to be transformative with respect to how they approach program development and assessment of program effectiveness in their daily roles on campus.
