

EQUALITY VERSUS EQUITY



In the first image, it is assumed that everyone will benefit from the same supports. They are being treated equally.



In the second image, individuals are given different supports to make it possible for them to have equal access to the game. They are being treated equitably.



In the third image, all three can see the game without any supports or accommodations because the cause of the inequity was addressed. The systemic barrier has been removed.



Core Feature of the Record

Faculty and program directors own the experience

- Apply to have an experience included on the Record
- Applications reviewed by subcommittee of the campus-level Program Review and Assessment Committee (PRAC) Three essential elements of an application (reviewed and approved by PRAC Subcommittee):
 - (a) learning outcomes aligned to the Profiles (campus level institutional learning outcomes)
 - (b) reflective artifact
 - (c) assessment of learning using a rubric
- Faculty/program directors decide which students receive the Record designation





Experiential and Applied Learning Record

IUPUI has a rich history in experiential and applied learning. Through numerous experiential, applied, integrative, and engaged learning experiences, IUPUI students learn how to communicate information and complex ideas, develop innovative solutions to real-world problems, and embrace civic engagement and service in partnership with their local and global community. 

- Project-Based Learning Activity

Jag Challenge

- Small groups of students pitch solutions to problems at a showcase event
- Campus/community “VIP” judges evaluate pitches

Jag Challenge on the Record

Jag Challenge on the Record

- Student learning is demonstrated through an end-of-experience written reflection and evaluated using an Innovation Rubric that was developed by the Institute for Engaged Learning
- Beyond the learning outcomes for the Jag Challenge itself, the activity supports the overarching goals of the First-Year Experience by providing opportunities for meaningful connections with other students, practicing communication skills, and early exposure to the benefits of engaged learning experiences.
- Participants have reported feeling an increased sense of belonging by having the opportunity to propose ideas at a very early stage in their academic career and document their contributions via the Record



In the Classroom

You will collaborate with the community through the research process and connect and engage with your culture and heritage. You will also examine issues that urge them to compare their own personal beliefs and value systems with those of the writers we encounter and evaluate the consequences of their multiple ethical positions.

You will investigate the inequities and discrimination within the African diaspora through the research. Construct research proposal documents, to such as an abstract, literature review, research methodology, research posters, and an oral research presentation. You will study using that text and with the professor's guidance.



Formal and informal written assignments and oral presentations will allow students to identify commonly used research methods, their application in the research process, and their importance to undergraduate research. Up work, and presentations allow building relationships and developing oral communication skills.

An aspect of learning this class is designed to help you develop and apply analytical and research skills through the weekly readings and the written assignments. You are urged to examine the functions and purposes of research through its relationship, importance to African descent populations, and "real world" praxis. Further, you are encouraged to draw conclusions about African American history and culture. You will analyze and issues are interconnected and collaborate.

Record Process

One-page application submitted (Admin by Tom Hahn); PRAC Subcommittee Review; Registrar verification

Learning outcomes aligned the Profiles

Student reflection in engaged and applied learning experiences

Assessment of learning using a rubric

Experience is owned by the faculty member or program director; responsible for ensuring students are entered into the Record upon completion (Institute for Engaged Learning can conduct initial data entry, with faculty member provides secondary validation)

Students can download their Record from one.iu and share with employers and graduate programs; use to frame cover letters and resume



- New Record Website – record.iupui.edu
 - Included dynamic search tool so students can search and filter for Record bearing experiences
- Registrar’s Office has created an automatic upload process for entering students into the Record
- Streamlined electronic application for faculty/staff – available on Record website
- Using ePortfolio to provide Record notation for unapproved experiences
